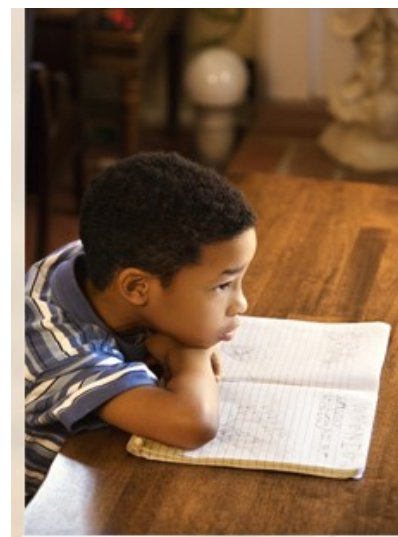


BELIEF STATEMENT

INTERVENTION AND PREVENTION

Trauma Informed Services—All of our work is done through a trauma lens. We strive to both prevent the experience of trauma in youth & families and support those who have experienced trauma in recovery and growth. We do this work through the **5 S's**: providing a physically and emotionally **S**afe environment, **S**upportive adult relationships, **S**trengths based services that teach and model **S**elf-regulation skills, and a dedication to **S**elf-care for all staff.

SUPPORTIVE SERVICES

- A. **Quality Improvement Department's** goal is to monitor agency compliance with all funding and accrediting bodies.
- B. **Finance Administration** responsibilities include funds disbursement for all budgeted programs, accounts payable, and employee payroll.
- C. **Information Technology Department** provides linkage to all agency data files; establishes internet connectivity; sets up and maintains PC workstations and produces brochures, annual report, and various other pertinent documents relative to the agency's needs.

CLINICAL PROGRAMS & RESIDENTIAL SERVICES***A. Transitional Living Program***

Pregnant & Parenting Transitional Living Program—The purpose of LCC's transitional living programs is to provide a safe and nurturing living environment for pregnant and parenting teens and their child(ren). Program services and supports are geared toward assisting the youth with achieving self-sufficiency on or before their twenty-first birthday. LCC's approach is to engage the youth in every aspect of their treatment and service planning thru life skills, mentoring, parenting, educational/vocational services, and mental health services.

Non-Pregnant & Parenting Transitional Living Program—The purpose of LCC's independent living program is to assist adolescent youth who need assistance with developing life skills. Program services and supports are geared toward assisting the youth with accessing post-secondary education/vocation and achieving self-sufficiency on or before their twenty-first birthday. LCC's approach is to engage the youth in every aspect of their treatment and service planning thru life skills, mentoring, parenting, educational/vocational services, and mental health services.

B. Independent Living Program

The purpose of LCC's independent living program is to assist adolescent females with safe and nurturing living environments for themselves and their child(ren) in the community. Program services and supports are geared toward assisting youths, ages 17^{1/2}—21, with accessing post-secondary education/vocation and achieving self-sufficiency.

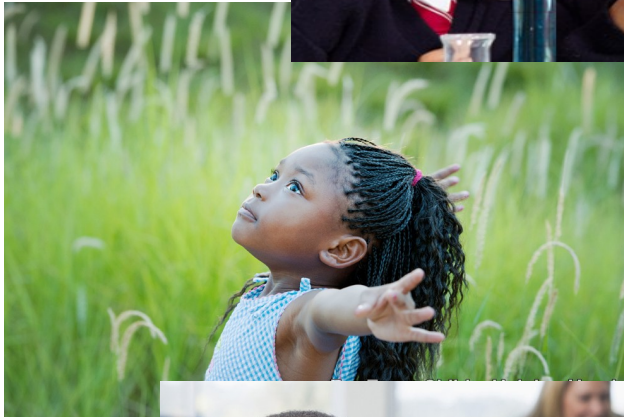

For Every Child a Helping Hand

Lakeside Community Committee is an important social service and economic anchor in the Chicago land area that has provided its surrounding communities with a broad spectrum of child and family oriented programs and services since its inception in 1964. Lakeside Community Committee is contracted by the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services (the Department) to provide foster care, kinship care, transitional living and independent living services to abused and neglected children and youth who can no longer be safely maintained in their birth parent's home. The age of the clients Lakeside services can range from newborn until the courts determine that wardship should be terminated—never exceeding twenty-one years of age.

Lakeside Community Committee's corporate office is located at 7418 So. Cottage Grove Avenue, Chicago, Illinois. The normal hours of operation is Monday thru Friday from 9:00am to 5:00pm.

Lakeside Community Committee has two transitional living programs (females only) on the south side of Chicago. These programs are located on the South Side of Chicago. These programs require staffing 24 hours per day, 365 days a year.

Lakeside Community Committee maintains after hours telephone coverage for use during emergency situations. The answering service telephone number is the main number to Lakeside Community Committee, as this ensures that in case of any emergency, all Lakeside Community Committee clients, caregivers, and providers know how to reach the appropriate personnel.

Foster Care Programs

Lakeside Community Committee's Traditional Foster Care Program provides a comprehensive range of individualized services, and a foster care living arrangement for children whose physical, mental or emotional needs will best be served in a family setting. The caregivers hold foster home licenses and can meet the cultural, developmental, emotional, and behavioral needs of children in care and their families.

Kinship Care Program provides a comprehensive range of individualized services and kinship living arrangement for children whose physical, mental, or emotional needs will best be served in a family setting. The caregiver is a legal or blood relative to the child(ren), as defined by the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services Rule 402 Licensing Standards for Foster Family Homes.
